Is your practice providing the highest quality of care for your LGBTQ+ patients?

Lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and questioning or queer (LGBTQ+) patients experience health care barriers and disparities based on their gender identity, gender expression and sexual orientation.

- More than 1 in 10 LGBTQ+ patients have experienced mistreatment by a physician or other health care provider.¹
- 15% of LGBTQ+ Americans report delaying or avoiding medical treatment due to discrimination, stigma, harassment and hate.¹
- LGBTQ+ patients are more likely to report lack of culturally competent care² and substandard care.³

Improve the care experience and health outcomes for LGBTQ+ patients by respectfully understanding your patient's gender identity to meet their health needs. Build relationships of trust, consistency and accountability to become an LGBTQ+ ally provider and LGBTQ+ experienced practice.

What are LGBTQ+ ally providers and LGBTQ+ experienced practices?

Being an LGBTQ+ ally provider means providing non-judgmental patient-centered care. It means respectful affirmation of patients' gender identity. An ally provider promotes LGBTQ+ inclusion across their practice to be recognized by their patients as LGBTQ+ experienced providers of quality care.

An LGBTQ+ allied and experienced practice:

- Allows patients the safety to share their gender identity and sexual orientation.
- Allows patients to feel valued and accepted.
- Encourages member engagement through use of properly documented names and pronouns.
- Helps decrease LGBTQ+ health care disparities by providing the highest quality of care.
